2019: Earned four All-American awards this season as the Mules quarterback. He was this season's MIAA and D2CCA Regional Offensive Player of the Year. Bolles threw for 4,290 yards this season completing 235-of-419 passes with 42 touchdown passes. He finished second in the NCAA in passing touchdowns and third in passing yards. Those numbers put him second all-time in Mules history for a single season. Bolles also added 228 rushing yards and four scores on the ground. His 18.26 yards per completion led the nation and his 347.5 yards of total offense per game ranked third in the country. In 12 games Bolles threw for more than 200 yards 11 times, he surpassed 300 yards in eight games and 400 yards in three. He set a new UCM record throwing for 506 yards in the Mules win at Missouri Western, the first 500-yard passing game in team history. 2018: Went into the season as an All-American candidate, but got injured in the second half of the season opener at Fort Hays State (Aug. 30) and missed the rest of the season. Was granted a medical redshirt to return in 2019. D2Football.com All-American Honorable Mention (2017), Don Hansen All-American Honorable Mention (2017), All-MIAA First Team (2017), Harlon Hill Finalist (2017).

Named team offensive player of the week vs. Bemidji State and St. Cloud State. Named team special teams player of the week vs. Winona State.

2019: Crews-Naylor earned All-MEC honors as a quarterback for the second-straight season after completing 143-of-231 pass attempts for 2,473 yards and 24 touchdowns as a senior. Crews-Naylor completed nearly 62 percent of his passes and averaged 247.3 yards through the air this season. He finished the regular season 24th in the country in passing yards and tied for 17th in touchdown passes. His 2,473 passing yards are the sixth-most in school history in a single season and his 24 TD passes are the third-most in a single season in Fairmont State history. Ended his career 365-of-593 for 5,683 yards and 52 touchdowns. He was only intercepted 17 times. Crews-Naylor ranks fourth in Fairmont State history in career passing yards (5,683), career completions (365), career touchdown passes (52) and career total offense (5,886). 2018: 2nd Team All-Mountain East Conference.

2019: Was a nominee for the Harlon Hill Trophy, was a dual-threat that helped lead a high-powered WOU offense all season. He was named the GNAC Offensive Player of the Year and to the first team after putting together an all-around spectacular senior campaign. The Yreka, Calif., native Currie put together a season to remember leading the GNAC in passing efficiency (152.1), passing yards (2,397), passing yards per completion (17.12), total offense (292.2) and yards per pass attempt (9.36). He ranks in the top-50 nationally in passing efficiency (26th), passing touchdowns with 20 (37th), passing yards (31st), passing yards per game with 217.9 (44th), passing yards per completion (5th), points responsible for with 190 (16th), points responsible for per game with 17.3 (22nd), rushing touchdowns with 11 (33rd), total offense with 292.9 (12th) and yards per pass attempt (8th). Currie's 11 rushing touchdowns this season ties the program record for most in a season since moving to Division II in 2000. He rushed 137 times for 825 yards, averaging 75 yards per game. Nine times this season he rushed for at least 50 yards in a game, going for over 100 yards in three different games including a high of 178 in the game against Azusa Pacific to help clinch the share of the GNAC title for the first time in school history. Rushed for a touchdown in seven games, twice putting together a pair of three TD games against Central Washington and Texas A&M-Kingsville. He was named GNAC Player of the Week three times and also to the GNAC Academic Team. He also completed 140-256 for 2,397 yards and 20 touchdowns, averaging 217 yards per game and compiling a 152.09 passer rating. Six times this season he threw for over 200 yards, twice going over 300 yards with a season-high 314 against Simon Fraser. He threw multiple touchdown passes in six games, three times throwing for at least three touchdowns with a high of four against Central Washington.

A four-year starter behind center, DiGalbo completed his career ranked second at KU in career passing yards (9,282), tied for second in rushing TDs (33), third in completions (725), third in passing attempts (1,140) and third in passing TDs (74). Was a four-time all-conference honoree and collected a pair of all-region nods from the Don Hansen Football Gazette.

Ranked 11th in the nation in passing efficiency (165.1) this season and 14th in yards per completion (14.8). Racked up 407 rushing yards and seven rushing TDs on the year, most by a UIndy QB since 2008 and 2010, respectively. Threw at least one TD pass in all 11 games, while adding a rushing TD in seven straight contests. 2017: All-GLVC Second Team, 2016: Harlon Hill Award candidate, All-Super Region Four Third Team (Don Hansen), GLVC Offensive Player of the Year, All-GLVC First Team. 2015: GLVC Freshman of the Year. Spent three seasons at fellow-GLVC-institution Southwest Baptist (2015-17). Led SBU to a 10-2 season in 2016, a season that included a co-GLVC championship and the school's first-ever NCAA playoff appearance. Named the 2016 GLVC Offensive Player of the Year and Harlon Hill Award candidate after setting a single-season school record with 44 total touchdowns, including a GLVC record of 34 passing TDs. Voted GLVC Freshman of the Year in 2015 and All-GLVC Second Team in 2017. Did not play in the 2018 season, spending the 2018-19 academic year at Dallas County Community College near his hometown.

The second team All-Mountain East Conference selection is ninth on the 2019 NCAA Division II passing yards per game charts. Thanks to his herculean 2019 efforts, Grisel set all five of the Golden Eagle top five single-game passing performances this season. His top outing came against NCAA playoff qualifier College of Notre Dame (Ohio), when he passed for 464 yards and three touchdowns on a 27-of-45 day. Later in the season, Grisel threw for four scores in a victory over Glenville State College.

His six passing touchdowns at Fairmont State set a new school record for passing touchdowns in a single game.

Very efficient, makes very few mistakes with the ball. 2019: Holmes racked up his first All-America recognition with an honorable mention nod from D2Football.com. Holmes was the catalyst for the Tarleton offense that went 23-2 over the last two seasons with him at the helm. In his senior season, Holmes was named the LSC Offensive Player of the Year and All-LSC First Team QB. He threw for 3,338 yards on a 59-percent completion percentage with a Tarleton single-season record 34 touchdowns and only three interceptions. He boasted a single-season QB rating of 174.9.

2019: The SIAC's top passing offense and one of the top in NCAA Division II was led by Jarman, which the senior quarterback received the top honors of SIAC Player of the Year, Offensive Player of the Year and All-SIAC First Team. The three-time SIAC Offensive Player of the Week and once named the BOXTOROW National Player of the Week ranked within NCAA Division II's Top 15 in eight different offensive categories when he unfortunately suffered a season-ending injury in the start of the third quarter of week eight's game. Jarman led the SIAC in passing yards per game (262.2 yds/gm) and set his personal best numbers of 174 completions in 281 attempts for 2,099 yards with 18 touchdowns to five interceptions for a 61.9-percent and a 142.25 pass efficiency rating. The Pensacola, Fla., native also rushed 123 yards on 74 carries with six touchdowns.

Against UMary, Lawhorn threw for 133 yards and five touchdowns which tied a school record that was previously set by Lawhorn himself. Lawhorn averaged just under 200 yards per game. The Huskies quarterback also threw for a season high 347 yards and two touchdowns against Southwest Minnesota State. 2018: All-Conference Honorable Mention. 2017: All-Conference Honorable Mention.

Transferred to IUP from Ohio University. 2019: Maxwell had one of the best years for a quarterback in IUP history in 2019. Maxwell set program single season records with 3,129 passing yards and 38 total touchdowns in leading the Crimson Hawks to a 10-2 record and NCAA Division II playoff berth. His 34 passing touchdowns are second to only Brian Eyeran's 36 (2002), while his 172.2 passing rating and 206 completions are fourth and his 63.0 completion percentage is fifth in IUP history. He finished fourth in Division II in passer rating and yards per pass attempt (9.56), was seventh in passing touchdowns, eighth in points responsible for (228), and 17th in completion percentage and passing yards per game (259.8). Maxwell became the first quarterback in IUP history to throw for 300 yards in three straight games and had eight games of three-plus touchdown passes. Typically an all-star bowl game for outgoing Division I seniors, Maxwell received a special small college exemption invitation to the FBS All-Americans Spiral Tropical Bowl after putting up big numbers in his only year with the Crimson Hawks.

A four-star member of Georgia's 2014 recruiting class, Park was rated as the No. 12 pro-style quarterback in the country; the No. 4 player at any position in the state of South Carolina; and the No. 229 player overall according to Rivals.com. Transferred to Iowa State. Played and started in the first four games before taking a personal medical leave of absence from the team. Park subsequently confirmed that he was facing a one-game suspension after testing positive for marijuana prior to his sabbatical. Good talent. Tries to force throws but strong armed and thinks he can will the completion. 2019: Park helped re-write the record books for the Lions this year. Park helped Southern set single-game record for points (86), margin of victory (79), and total offense (743), while also setting an MSSU and MIAA record with 42 first downs in a game against Northeastern State. Park also set a single-game record with five passing touchdowns and eight total touchdowns responsible for in that game. He finished the season with 3,403 passing yards which ranks second-best in a single-season at MSSU, as well as 3,385 yards of total offense, which is third-best.

Someone needs to take a chance on this guy. Rivers earned an invite to be one of the quarterbacks at the Hula Bowl after putting together a record-shattering senior season while leading Slippery Rock in 2019. He set the Division II single-season record for points responsible for with 370 and tied the Division II single-season records for touchdowns responsible for (61) and games with at least three passing touchdowns (11). Rivers also shattered the SRU single-season records for completions (322), passing yards (4,460), passing touchdowns (52) and total offense (5,160). His 52 passing touchdowns are the fourth most in Division II history in a single-season and he became just the fourth player in Division II history to top 5,000 total offensive yards in a single-year. Rivers ranked first in the nation in passing yards (4,460), passing touchdowns (52), total offense (5,160) and points responsible for (370) and finished the year completing 322-of-481 passes for 4,460 yards with 52 touchdowns and just seven interceptions, while also rushing for 700 yards and nine touchdowns. He shattered the SRU career record for touchdown passes, throwing 80 in just 26 games over two seasons at The Rock. Rivers, who played his first two years at Valdosta State, finished his four-year career with 9,041 passing yards, 1,723 rushing yards, 99 passing touchdowns, 20 rushing touchdowns, 10,764 yards of total offense and 119 total touchdowns responsible for. His 99 career touchdown passes are 25 more than any other active player in Division II at the end of 2019. He led Slippery Rock to a 13-1 record in 2019 with a trip to the NCAA Division II Semifinals. Rivers went 23-3 as a starter at SRU over the last two years of his career, leading The Rock to at least the NCAA Quarterfinals in each year. He became the first SRU player ever to be awarded the Harlon Hill Trophy as the Division II National Player of the Year. Rivers also earned multiple first team All-America recognitions, was the National Offensive Player of the Year in Division II and was just announced as the Maxwell Football Club's Brian Westbrook Regional Athlete of the Year.

Walters has completed 162-of-264 passes with 24 TDs against three interceptions and is first in the NSIC and 15th in DII pass efficiency ranking of 164.0. With 2,781 total yards or 252.8 per game, Walters ranks second in the NSIC in total offense per game and sits 32nd in DII. Walters had just three interceptions this season and had a pass streak of 148 straight passes without an interception. One of the league's top dual-threat signal callers, Walters has 112 carries for 428 yards (3.8 avg.) with eight TDs this season. He has 162 carries for 573 yards and 10 TDs in his career. As for his career passing numbers, he is now 307-of-488 for 62.9 percent for 4,386 yards with 38 TDs and 10 interceptions in his career. He ranks ninth in school history in passing yards with 4,386 and is 12th in total offense with 4,980 yards (690 plays, 7.2 yards per play – fourth all-time).

He dotted his name multiple times in the records books in the section for top 10 passing yards for a single game, and threw a career-best 469 yards against nationally ranked Tiffin for the second-best single game in the Storm's history. Against Kentucky Wesleyan, he led the Storm to their first win since 2017 with six touchdowns, four of which came through the air. Smith repeats the same honors from last season as he was also named an honorable mention then.
