The Baltimore native set the single-season total offense mark with 3,861 yards while rewriting nearly every career passing record. He finished eighth in the voting for the Walter Payton Award. 2018: Second-Team All-Big South. Finished first in the Big South in completions, passing yards, passing touchdowns, passing yards per game, and passing efficiency.

Burst onto the scene in 2015 being named an All-American and FCS STATS National Freshman of the Year, Jerry Rice Award Winner, College Sports Madness FCS National Freshman of the Year, College Football Performance Awards (CFPA) National Performer of the Year, College Football Performance Awards (CFPA) National Freshman Performer of the Year but injuries in '16 and '18 hurt his stock a bit. Cookus was named second team all-conference following the most prolific passing season in NAU history. The senior signal caller broke the Lumberjacks' single-season mark for passing yards with 4,114 and tossed 31 touchdowns. He was just the 10th player in league history to reach 4,000 passing yards in a season. In addition, Cookus became NAU's all-time leader and just the fourth player in Big Sky Conference history to post over 12,000 career aerial yards – with his total of 12,082. His 105 career touchdown passes rank as the most on NAU annals and he is only the second player in Big Sky history to record 100 or more TD tosses. In 2019, Cookus threw for over 300 yards in nine times and threw at least two touchdown passes in nine games. He was among the national and Big Sky leaders in nearly every passing category including topping the FCS in passing yards (4,114) and passing yards per game (342.8). He paced the conference and ranked sixth nationally with 31 touchdown passes and ranked second in the league in passing efficiency (150.5). Cookus is a two-time All-Big Sky selection.

2019: Pressed into action after Jeremiah Oatsvall was lost for the regular season, the senior responded with a monster final campaign, throwing for 2,567 yards and 22 touchdowns on 180-of-318 through the air, and rushing for 547 yards on 105 carries and eight scores as a complementary threat out of the backfield. His 141.0 pass efficiency led the conference and ranked 31st in the NCAA, while his 22 scores ranked second and 21st, respectively. He also averaged 14.3 yards per completion, 12th in the NCAA and first in the league. He's the first Austin Peay quarterback since 1980 to earn first-team All-OVC honors.

Ranks first all-time at Princeton in lowest interception percentage (6 in 374 passes). Honorable mention All-Ivy League selection. East-West Shrine Bowl participant. Had the fifth-best single-season passing yardage total and fourth-best number of touchdown passes in a season in program history.

DiNucci has also rushed for 498 yards and six scores. He's thrown at least two touchdowns in nine games and has over 200 passing yards nine times this season. 2018: Third Team All-CAA quarterback.

Became NSU's single-season passing yardage record-holder by throwing for 306 yards at Sam Houston State on Nov. 16 and added the game-winning score with his first career touchdown run. Established school single-game records for completions (43) and attempts (62) while throwing for the second-most yards (387) in school history in a 42-20 loss at UT Martin on Aug. 29. Summer 2019: Served as a counselor at the annual Manning Passing Academy in Thibodaux, hosted by Archie, Peyton and Eli Manning. 2018 All-Southland honorable mention.



Finished his career with 1,496 rushing yards, the most by any Dartmouth quarterback, and 21 touchdowns, tied for fifth all-time at the school.

He finished his MSU career ranked second all-time in total offense (7,465) and touchdown passes (38), while ranking third in Bears' history in completions (553) and passing yardage (6,405). He also posted 12 200-yard passing games and four 100-yard rushing games in his career, while earning All-MVFC honorable mention and MVFC All-Newcomer Team laurels in 2017. 2019, 2017: All-MVFC honorable mention.

2019: A three-time Walter Payton Award candidate finished off one of the most outstanding careers for any UC Davis quarterback in history. He completed 322 of 492 passes for 3,563 yards and 28 touchdowns, and finished third in the Big Sky in passing yards per game (296.9), fifth in total offense (290.1) and eighth in passing efficiency (139.8). His 26.83 completions per game topped the league and ranked third nationally at the close of the regular season. Overall, the 2017 Big Sky Conference Newcomer of the Year and 2018 Offensive Player of the Year now rates as the school's all-time career leader in attempts (1,495), completions (992) and passing yards (11,163) while ranking second only to J.T. O'Sullivan with 88 TD passes. He enjoyed six games of 300-plus yards in 2019, bringing his career total to another UC Davis benchmark of 21.

He was the first Wofford quarterback to throw for more than 1,000 yards in back to back seasons since 1999-01.

Completed 109-of-192 pass attempts (56.7 pct) for 1,232 yards with 11 touchdowns and seven interceptions. Finished with multiple passing touchdowns in four contests. 2018: Started all 13 games in his first season with the Dukes. Closed the regular season ranking 16th in the FCS in pass efficiency, 17th in completion percentage and 20th in yards per pass attempt. Led the NEC with 27 total touchdowns (20 passing, 7 rushing). Ranked second in the NEC in pass efficiency (140.7). Threw for multiple touchdowns in seven games, including a pair of three-touchdown performances.

Additionally, he was tabbed by STATS as a finalist for the Walter Payton Award, the FCS Offensive Player of the Year. A three-time All-Ivy League selection and Ivy record holder for Player of the Week honors in a season with six, set every passing and total offense record at Yale. Led the Ivy League in passing yards (3,002), touchdown passes (27), passing yards per game (300.2) and efficiency (163.5). This season he ranks fourth nationally in points per game (21.2), fourth in total offense (331.6), fifth in passing yards per game (300.2), fifth in points responsible for (212), seventh in pass efficiency (163.5), seventh in yards per attempt (9.24), 16th in touchdowns (27) and 16th in passing yards (3,002) despite only playing 10 games. 2018, 2017: All-Ivy Honorable Mention.

The Pembroke Pines, Fla. native was the top passer in the MEAC, averaging over 256 yards per game. He has broken four program career records at Florida A&M, setting new marks for passing touchdowns, passing completions, passing attempts and passing yards. He threw for 2,566 yards and 23 touchdowns this season and had three 300-yard games, including a 427-yard outing against South Carolina State. Stanley, who earned MEAC Offensive Player of the Year honors last week in New York City, is a Black College Football Player of the Year finalist and is the first FAMU player to win BOXTOROW Offensive Player of the Year honors.

A First Team All-MEAC selection and MEAC Offensive Player of the Year recipient, Stanley was also on the Watch List for the Walter Payton Award and is a finalist for the Black College Football Player of the Year award. Stanley leaves the Rattlers as the all-time career leader in touchdowns (67), pass attempts (1,187), completions (636) and passing yards (8,424). He is ranked first in MEAC history in pass attempts and second in total passing yards (8,424) and pass completions. 2018: Third-team All-MEAC.
