

Kyle Avaloy Illinois State 6-5 330 OG

Started in all 12 games for the Redbirds at left guard. Redbirds were the No. 6 in the MVFC in total offense (385.4) Was a key member of the offensive line that helped two different running backs rush for over 100 yards multiple times. In 2015: Second Team All-MVFC selection at left guard.

Sam Baptiste Alabama State 6-4 340 OG

1st All SWAC. Was the Hornets most consistent man on the offensive line as he helped pave the way for Alabama State's top rushing attack in the conference.

Justin Barksdale SE Louisiana 6-3 290 OG OT

Won tackle job during junior season. Was expected to move to guard but settled in at RT. Probably best at guard.

Griffin Barth Bucknell 6-4 290 OG

Second Team All-Patriot League selection. Earned team's John Campana Award as the squad's top offensive lineman. Appeared in all 11 games and made 10 starts on offensive line. Started the first five games at right guard and made six starts there overall; also started four times at right tackle.

Armando Bonheur Samford 6-3 305 OG

2nd All SoCon. Started the 2013 season opener at Georgia State at right guard before suffering a season-ending injury and receiving a medical redshirt. Was a backup in 2014 then started his last two seasons. Blocked for a very potent passing game.

Olandrious Booker UT-Martin 6-5 350 OG

Started every game at left guard. As a squad, the Skyhawks posted a sack per dropback percentage of 4.79 percent to lead all league foes. He started in all 12 games for the Skyhawks at center while grading out at 84 percent or better all season. Manhandling opposing defenses, he was responsible for 37 knockdowns on the season.

Jamal Boulden Southern 6-2 290 OG

1st All SWAC plowed open several running lanes for the league's all-time leading rusher over the last three seasons; while providing decent pass protection as well.

Toree Boyd Howard 6-4 315 OG OT

1st All MEAC, Boxtorow All American has been the mainstay on the Bison's offensive line for the past four years and started a school record 46 straight games, eclipsing the old mark of 44.

Terrance Boyd Northwestern State 6-3 335 OG

2016 Preseason All- Southland Conference, Second Team
2015 All- Southland Conference Honorable Mention, 2015 Southland Conference Commissioner's Fall Honor Roll, Missed the first five games of 2015 with a dislocated ankle and fractured fibula but has started ever since; mostly at guard.

Michael Boyd St. Francis (PA) 6-4 310 OG

Played in all 12 games on the offensive line and special teams. Helped the SFU offense to average 26.9 points and 345.1 total yards per game. SFU also averaged 218.9 passing yards and 126.2 rushing yards per contest.

Mitchell Boyd St. Francis (PA) 6-2 330 OG

Played in 10 games, including two starts at Right Guard. Helped the SFU offense to average 26.9 points and 345.1 total yards per game. SFU also averaged 218.9 passing yards and 126.2 rushing yards per contest.

Jackson Buonamia Furman 6-3 290 OG

Started at center and tackle after switching to d-line as freshman then back to o-line. Part of o-line that gave up only 1 sacks in 2016.

Matthew Campion Albany (NY) 6-6 355 OG OT

3-year starter at tackle and guard. Coach Jim Sweeney, former NFL lineman, loves Campion's physical game, but they is even more impressed with the mental side of the gentle giant. "I think he's a big man who plays big. He's not afraid to mix it up. He has the size, and I like his athleticism," Sweeney said of Campion. "He's also very nimble for a big guy. He's also very positive. He just goes out and plays every day, just like offensive linemen are supposed to do. People don't realize that as offensive linemen, everything we do is a learned technique. It's not a natural position for us to play. You must be tough mentally, and Matt is definitely that. He's a tough guy, and he has excellent instincts."

Tyler Cardoze Bryant 6-4 325 OG

Team's OFFENSIVE LINEMAN OF THE YEAR, Cardoze made 10 starts on the offensive line for the Bulldogs this past fall on his way to earning Second Team All-NEC honors. He made starts at right tackle, left guard and left tackle during the season, helping the Bulldogs post one of the best passing games in the NEC.

Keonte Cash Florida A&M 6-1 290 OG OC

Three-time All-MEAC. Started as a true freshman at left guard, enduring a baptism of fire, along with a number of his freshmen mates on a patchwork offensive line, maturing quickly into a reliable blocker.

Wes Cole NC A&T 6-6 335 OG OT

1st All MEAC, earned his first all-conference honor. He is a four-year starter for the Aggies who has mostly played right tackle but has also started at right guard. He earned one offensive lineman of the week honor on Oct. 24 after the Aggies defeated Howard 34-7.

Dylan Colucci Youngstown State 6-6 330 OG OT

4.50/40, HM All MVC, Started all 11 games at right tackle. As a unit, YSU ranks seventh in the FCS in rushing yards per game averaging 260.5 yards per game. In MVFC play, the Penguins averaged a league-best 248.0 yards a game. TB Martin Ruiz rushed for more than 1,000 yards. The Guins started three different QBs and had four play during an 8-3 season. Played every snap in six of eight MVFC games.

Nico D'Angelo Villanova 6-3 285 OG

Three-year starter who served as a tri-captain for the 2016 Wildcats. Experienced performer was looked upon to provide leadership along the offensive line.

Zach Davis Dartmouth 6-6 310 OG

Two-year starter. Part of an offensive line that yielded fewer sacks (13) than any other Ivy League squad while ranking first in the conference in passing yards.

Nick Demes Penn 6-3 285 OG OT

1st All Ivy, 2nd AP All American, A second-team AP All-American, Demes moved to left tackle for his senior season after three seasons as a standout on the right side of the line and earned first-team All-Ivy honors at his new position. A tri-captain for the Quakers, Demes was part of an offensive line which blocked for a rushing attack which led the Ivy League in yards-per-rush (4.5) and featured the Ivy League's leading rusher in Tre Solomon (907 yards). Demes was also charged with protecting quarterback Alek Torgersen, and did so to the tune of a repeat first-team All-Ivy selection for the signal-caller. Demes helped Torgersen find time to throw 17 touchdown passes this season – second among Ivy QBs – while only throwing four interceptions – fewest among Ivy starting quarterbacks – and ensuring Torgersen was sacked the second-fewest times of any Ivy quarterback. In his 10 games as starting left tackle, Demes was on the field for 645 plays and allowed just four sacks while finishing with 71 total knockdowns. Over the course of his four years, Demes played in 37 of a potential 40 games with 31 starts. His work on the offensive line has helped propel Penn skill position players to a total of 11 All-Ivy selections over the past four years.

Eric Dickerson SC State 6-4 300 OG

Decent lineman. Has the basics and could be coached into a servicable lineman.

Devon Dietrich Montana 6-4 310 OG

HM All Big Sky. A three-year starter. He was the only offensive line player to receive a preseason award by the league after earning an honorable mention in 2015 as well.

Brock Eisenhuth Youngstown State 6-5 350 OG

1st All MVC, Started all eight conference games at guard after missing the non-conference slate because of an injury. Made an immediate impact on the line once returning from injury. As a unit, YSU ranks seventh in the FCS in rushing yards per game averaging 260.5 yards per game. In MVFC play, the Penguins averaged a league-best 248.0 yards a game. TB Martin Ruiz rushed for more than 1,000 yards. The Guins started three different QBs and had four play during an 8-3 season. Played every snap in six of eight MVFC games.

Nick Enriquez *Cal Poly* **6-5 290 OG OT**

Three-year starter. Part of an offensive line that allowed just seven sacks in 12 games and helped the Mustangs finish third in the FCS in third-down conversions and passing efficiency and No. 7 in time of possession.

Thomas Evans *Richmond* **6-3 315 OG C**

The emotional leader for the Spiders and has started nearly 40 consecutive games for Richmond. He was an anchor to an offensive line that led the Spiders to the top passing offense in the CAA and one of the top offenses in the country. He and his linemates blocked for three different 100-yard rushers this year when injuries riddled the Spiders' backfield. Earlier this year, he was recognized as the State's Top Offensive Lineman by the TD Club of Richmond.

Matt Fisher *Cal Poly* **6-5 285 OG OT**

1st All Big Sky, 3rd Stats FCS All American. A tackle, anchored an offensive line that allowed just seven sacks in 12 games and helped the Mustangs finish third in the FCS in third-down conversions and passing efficiency and No. 7 in time of possession.

James Floyd, Jr. *Northern Colorado* **6-3 320 OG**

Tulsa transfer. Followed 2015 campaign with a solid season as a starter on the offensive line. Helped pave the way for 1,894 rush yards and 20 touchdowns on the ground.

JP Flynn *Montana State* **6-5 320 OG OT**

After starting 43 consecutive games and anchoring an inexperienced offensive line that blocked for the 17th-ranked rushing attack in the FCS, Flynn was named 2nd Team All-America by STATS. The Bobcats averaged 212.0 rushing yards a game this season, with Flynn as the offensive line's only senior and lone full-time returning starter. Has a high football IQ

John Foster *Cornell* **6-5 280 OG**

HM All Ivy was a two-year starter at right guard, opening his final 20 collegiate games in the lineup. He was part of an offensive line that allowed five fewer sacks in 2016 than in 2015 and blocked for three 100-yard rushing games and three 300-yard passing games. In all, the Big Red's scoring was up 8.8 points per game and total offense increased 57 yards per game.

Matt Frank *James Madison* **6-3 300 OG**

Started all 15 games at right guard. Second Team All-CAA Offensive Lineman. VaSID Second Team All-State. Roanoke Times Second Team All-State. Part of an offensive line that set JMU and CAA single-season records in scoring (700), rushing offense (4,125), total offense (7,612) and first downs (380). Offense led the FCS in completion percentage (70.8%), team pass efficiency (181.69) and first downs. Also ranked second in scoring (46.7), third in total offense (507.5), fourth in third-down conversions (50%), fifth in rushing (275.0) and 10th in turnovers lost (13). JMU produced more than 50 points in six games this season with an average win margin at 25.5 points per game. Received John David Krauss Memorial Award. One of four team captains in 2016.

Samuel Freireich *St. Francis (PA)* **6-4 300 OG**

1st All NEC, Freireich has started all 22 games since arriving on the SFU campus from Blinn College(Texas). Helped Saint Francis to average 27.5 points and 352.5 total yards per game.

Mason Friedline *Yale* **6-4 300 OG**

HM All Ivy, was named Yale's top offensive lineman after starting every game this season. He helped protect a freshman quarterback who led the Blue to victory in The Game.

Ryan Garretson *Eastern Kentucky* **6-5 314 OG**

Started all 11 games at left guard. Helped ECU average 247.6 passing yards per game, third in the OVC and 32nd in the nation. Eastern totaled 500 or more yards of offense four times. Was the starting left guard when Bennie Coney set a new school record with 464 passing yards at Tennessee Tech. Helped the Colonels rush for 346 yards at Austin Peay, eclipsing the 300-yard rushing mark for the first time since 2014.

Ty Gatson *NC Central* **6-3 290 OG**

Was really not expected to be a starter but took over the guard spot and stayed throughout season.

Flint Geier *Cornell* **6-3 315 OG OC**

He was part of an offensive line that allowed five fewer sacks in 2016 than in 2015 and blocked for three 100-yard rushing games and three 300-yard passing games. In all, the Big Red's scoring was up 8.8 points per game and total offense increased 57 yards per game.

Ryan Gelber *Illinois State* **6-5 300 OG**

Played in eight games, with six starts at right guard. In 2015: Started all 13 games at right tackle for the Redbirds and was a key member of the offensive line unit which led the way for First-Team All-American and two-time MVFC Offensive Player of the Year Marshaun Coprich.

Nathan Gibbs *Columbia* **6-5 295 OG**

Two-year starter. Strong run blocker with decent athleticism.

Michael Gilbert *Rhode Island* **6-5 300 OG**

Started eight games at left guard before suffering a season-ending injury. Blocked for a ground game that ran for a season-high 180 yards and three touchdowns against Brown (10/1). Helped block for a ground attack that gained 85 yards and scored two touchdowns against New Hampshire (9/24). Started at left guard as Rams rushed for 98 yards and two touchdowns at Harvard (9/16). Was part of line that helped Rams rush for 146 yards and allow just one sack against Albany (9/10). Also served as a game captain. Started at left guard and was part of line that helped Rams rush for 170 yards and allow just one sack at Kansas (9/3).

George Griffin Holy Cross 6-4 306 OG

Two-year starter part of an offensive line which paved the way for the Crusaders to average 356.0 total yards, 103.8 rushing yards and 23.5 point per game on the year, even with the team using three different starting quarterbacks and three different starting tailbacks due to injuries.

Corey Grinner Texas Southern 6-4 315 OG

Good-sized lineman. 2016 starter at guard.

Eric Haas Davidson 6-1 305 OG

Helped anchor a Davidson offensive line that allowed just 14 sacks, tied for fourth lowest in the PFL.

Trevor Hanson Northern Iowa 6-4 305 OG

2nd All MVC, Hanson has started 28 games in the Purple and Old Gold and was part of the 2016 team that helped UNI to 3,975 yards of total offense including 20 rushing touchdowns and 13 passing scores.

Sam Hardy Sam Houston State 6-3 310 OG

Former DT, Wyoming transfer, Blocked for the Kats offense that averaged 54.2 points and 584.0 yards per game in 2016, while ranking fifth in the country in allowing just eight sacks for the year.

Cary Hess Bucknell 6-4 300 OG

Career: 25 games played, 12 games started, 1 tackle. 2016 (Senior): Appeared in all 11 games for the second consecutive season. One of five seniors to receive regular playing time on the offensive line. Made six starts, five starts at right guard, one start at left guard.

Hunter Hudgins Holy Cross 6-5 315 OG

Starter before injury limited his 2015 season. Part of an offensive line which paved the way for the Crusaders to average 356.0 total yards, 103.8 rushing yards and 23.5 point per game on the year, even with the team using three different starting quarterbacks and three different starting tailbacks due to injuries.

Trevin Huff Bethune-Cookman 6-4 291 OG

Two-year starter. Usually grades out above 83 percent in all games.

Sam Jenkins Alabama State 6-3 320 OG

Starter. Helped pave the way for Alabama State's top rushing attack in the conference.

Zach Johnson North Dakota State 6-4 327 OG

1st Stats FCS All American, East-West Shrine Game, 1st AP All American, ADA All American, 1st AFCA All American, Walter Camp All America, 1st All MVC had six All-American first team awards in 2016 and played in the East-West Shrine Game. Started all 14 games and helped lead an NDSU rushing attack that averaged 240.9 yards per game.

Kevin Kenton Tennessee State 6-1 300 OG

2nd All OVC, started all 11 games at right guard and was named Second Team All-Ohio Valley Conference. A mainstay on the offensive line for the top scoring team in the OVC, averaging 32.3 points per game, Kenton helped the offense generate 415.1 yards per game and topped the OVC at 6.6 yards per play. The line allowed an OVC low, 14 sacks.

Jack Knight Princeton 6-5 315 OG

Played in two games on the offensive line before suffering season-ending injury during Tigers' Ivy League championship season.

Dylan LaFrenz Northern Arizona 6-4 300 OG

Sat out 2015 with an injury but returned in 2016 to have a good year in his first year as a full-time starter at LG.

Cameron Lee Illinois State 6-6 310 OG OT

Wrapped up a five-year career at Illinois State in December, when the Redbirds ended their season in the FCS playoffs for the third-consecutive season. The 6-foot-6, 320 pound lineman started every game at guard during the 2015 conference championship season for the Redbirds and played there in 2016 as well, until a late season move out to play right tackle. He was named an All-Missouri Valley Football Conference Honorable Mention selection for his efforts in his final season at ISU.

Corey Levin Chattanooga 6-5 305 OG OT

a four-year starter and two-time winner of the Southern Conference Jacob's Blocking Award has been one of the top offensive linemen in the FCS over the last three seasons. Levin has started at both tackle and guard positions and has been a consensus All-American each of the last three years. He repeated on the AFCA All-American squad in 2016 and was a second team selection by STATS and the Associated Press.

Will Lewis Delaware 6-5 285 OG

Fifth-year member of the squad as a senior offensive lineman. Four-year letterwinner, third-year starter at guard and one of four returning starters on a unit. Versatile player who can also play center. Big frame with good footwork. Has played in 26 career games with 22 starts at Delaware..

Domenic Martinelli William & Mary 6-4 300 OG

Fixture on W&M's offensive line all four years, totaling 40 career starts. 2016: Started all 11 games at right guard.

Erik McCauley Fordham 6-4 300 OG

He helped Fordham lead the Patriot League and rank fourth in the NCAA FCS in total offense, averaging 498.2 yards/game, and lead the league and rank 12th in the NCAA FCS in rushing offense, averaging 229.7 yards/game. The Rams also led the Patriot League and were fourth in the nation in scoring, averaging 40.1 points per game, and second in the League and 29th in the nation in first downs (257).

Tad McNeely New Hampshire 6-2 295 OG C

CAA All-Conference First Team honoree, anchored New Hampshire's offensive line by starting all 13 games as a senior center. Behind his blocking efforts, the Wildcats averaged 28.5 points per game as well as 379.2 yards per game with a breakdown of 181.2 rushing yards and 197.9 passing yards. McNeely also helped UNH score a program-record 64 points in a postseason game in the 64-21 NCAA FCS first round win vs. Lehigh. The 'Cats amassed 637 yards of total offense that game and eclipsed 500 total yards two other games.

Shane McQuillan Central Connecticut 6-5 290 OG OT

1st All NEC. Helped lead an offensive line that saw the Blue Devils produce 3,944 yards of total offense on the year, including a program-high 2,939 yards in the air.

Mike Meinert South Dakota 6-3 295 OG OC

Had one start at center in 2014 but for the most part 2016 was his first as a full-time starter.

Sean Merrill Sacred Heart 6-4 290 OG

Earned his first career postseason honor with his All-NEC Second Team selection. Merrill was part of an offensive line that allowed a conference-low 13 sacks this season.

Tyler Miles Austin Peay 6-3 325 OG

Starter. Impressive young man. Athletics Director's Honor Roll (S13, F13, F14, F15, S16), Dean's List (F15, S16), President's List (F15, S16). In 2015 he was the lone upperclassman along the offensive front, and he did all he could to band a youthful group together as a captain. Started every game, but was all over the field—two starts at left tackle, five starts at left guard and four starts at right tackle.

Thor Miller McNeese State 6-3 305 OG

Two-year starter. After being known as a strong run blocker, played a key role in team's successful passing games in 2016.

Dequan Miller Wofford 6-2 300 OG

Started 13 of 14 games played at left guard. Finished the season with 100 knockdown blocks. Named All-Southern Conference second team by the media.

Dan Morin Cornell 6-3 305 OG

He was part of an offensive line that allowed five fewer sacks in 2016 than in 2015 and blocked for three 100-yard rushing games and three 300-yard passing games. In all, the Big Red's scoring was up 8.8 points per game and total offense increased 57 yards per game.

O'Shane Morris *Elon* **6-4 295 OG**

Three-year starter and played in all 12 contests as a true freshman. Big-bodied and experienced lineman.

Anthony Mosley *Southern* **6-1 280 OG**

1st All SWAC plowed open several running lanes for the league's all-time leading rusher; while providing decent pass protection as well.

Curtis Nealer *New Hampshire* **6-3 310 OG**

Hard-nosed, two-year starter who seldom misses a game or a snap for that matter.

Daniel Oladimeji *Norfolk State* **6-2 300 OG**

Starter. Moved to tackle in 2015 but back to guard for the 2016 season.

Connor O'Neill *Bryant* **6-3 300 OG**

4-year starter. Helped the Bulldogs post one of the best passing games in the NEC. Also a solid run-blocker.

Nick Piker *Holy Cross* **6-5 305 OG**

Two-year starter part of an offensive line which paved the way for the Crusaders to average 356.0 total yards, 103.8 rushing yards and 23.5 point per game on the year, even with the team using three different starting quarterbacks and three different starting tailbacks due to injuries.

Jack Plankers *North Dakota State* **6-7 325 OG OT**

2nd All MVC, Starter in 2016 at right guard. Played significantly throughout his 4 year career at both tackle and guard.

John Reddington *Maine* **6-5 290 OG**

Helped anchor a Maine's offensive line which produced eight games of over 100 yards rushing and helped guide a unit which surrendered just 14 sacks all season; down four from a year ago.

Eric Rodriguez *Northern Arizona* **6-3 295 OG**

All-Big Sky in the past but has battled injury. Showed great promise when he was on the field.

Evan Ross *Southern Utah* **6-6 305 OG OT**

HM All Big Sky, two year starter has seen significant time since sophomore year.

Kyron Samuels *Jacksonville State* **6-2 320 OG C**

2nd Team All-OVC. Helped anchor the Gamecocks offensive line that paved the way for the top offense and rushing offense in the OVC. Jax State rolled up 434 yards per game, 250.6 per game on the ground.

Reid Sealby *Southern Illinois* **6-3 285 OG OT**

Spent three years at the University of Iowa. Redshirted in 2012 and did not see action in 2013 and 2014. In 2016, helped pave the way for SIU's offense, which ranked second in the MVFC in both scoring and total offense. The Salukis led the MVFC in passing offense and set program single-season records for passing completions, attempts and yardage.

Paul Spada *Central Connecticut* **6-5 295 OG**

4-year starter. Helped lead an offensive line that saw the Blue Devils produce 3,944 yards of total offense on the year, including a program-high 2,939 yards in the air.

Calvin Steyn *Weber State* **6-4 320 OG OT**

2nd All Big Sky, Finished his two-year career at Weber State in 2016. He twice earned All-Big Sky Conference honors and started all 23 games of his career. 2016: Served as one of the Weber State team captains during the year, helping Weber State to a 7-5 record, a third-place finish in the Big Sky Conference and its first trip to the FCS Playoffs in seven years.

David Sutton *Gardner-Webb* **6-3 303 OG**

1st All Big South helped Gardner-Webb set a new program standard in rushing since its move to into the Big South. The Runnin' Bulldogs averaged 229.0 yards per game on the ground – its best mark since moving into the league in 2002. Sutton played a key role, starting 10 games and leading the team with 15 pancake blocks. He graded out at 77.3 percent for the season – best on the team – and had five games at 80 percent or greater.

Micah Tennant *Lehigh* **6-6 290 OG**

Started all 12 games at left guard. first team CoSIDA Academic All-American. Academic All-Patriot League selection. Contributor to offensive line that paved way for offense that ranked in top 10 nationally in scoring, total yards and passing yards. Mountain Hawks established school record for points and total offense. Named to Patriot League Academic Honor Roll.

Edrick Thigpen *Alcorn State* **6-4 330 OG**

Part of an offensive line that's helped Alcorn rank top-10 in the nation in sacks allowed, giving up just 0.90 per game. Heavily aided the Braves rank No. 17 in the country and second in the SWAC in rushing offense.

Brett Treadway *Lamar* **6-3 280 OG**

Played in and started 43 games during his four years at LU. 2016: Preseason All-America selection. Overcame injuries to play in and start eight games. Due to a number of injuries on the offensive side of the ball, Treadway protected five different quarterbacks during his final season in a Red and White uniform.

Anton Wahrby *Wofford* **6-5 300 OG OT**

From Karlskrona, Sweden. 2016: Voted Team's Best Offensive Lineman. Started all 14 games at right tackle. Second on the team with 160 knockdown blocks. Ended career with 525 knockdown blocks to rank third in school history. Named All-Southern Conference first team by the coaches and media. Earned third team All-America honors from the Associated Press and STATS. College Sports Madness All-America first team and HEROES All-America second team. Reached double-digit knockdowns in ten games. Led the team in knockdown blocks four times on the season

Jake Waltman Cornell 6-3 292 OG

Broke the starting lineup for the first time as a senior. Was a reserve lineman in previous seasons.

Matt Wawrzyniak Stetson 6-4 290 OG

Four-year starter. Helped resurrect the Stetson football program after a 55 year absence as one of the original signees.

Kyle Weaver The Citadel 6-2 285 OG OC

2nd All SoCon, locks for an offense that leads the Southern Conference in eight different categories. The Citadel's two sacks allowed this season are the fewest in all of Division I, and its average of 358.5 rushing yards per game ranks second in Division I. The Bulldogs also lead the Southern Conference in time of possession, yards per completion, fewest tackles for loss allowed, rushing touchdowns, third-down conversions and yards per rush. Their average time of possession of 34 minutes, 42 seconds ranks second in FCS, while the Bulldogs' 16.7 yards per completion and 3.4 tackles for loss allowed rank third in FCS, and the 32 rushing touchdowns rank as the fifth-highest total in the country.

Terrance Wells NC Central 6-3 300 OG

1st All MEAC graded out at 84 percent on blocking assignments from his guard position and ranked second on the team with 43 pancake blocks.

Nick Whitton Penn 6-3 290 OG

Part of an offensive line which blocked for a rushing attack which led the Ivy League in yards-per-rush (4.5) and featured the Ivy League's leading rusher in Tre Solomon (907 yards). Demes was also charged with protecting quarterback Alek Torgersen, and did so to the tune of a repeat first-team All-Ivy selection for the signal-caller. Demes helped Torgersen find time to throw 17 touchdown passes this season – second among Ivy QBs – while only throwing four interceptions – fewest among Ivy starting quarterbacks – and ensuring Torgersen was sacked the second-fewest times of any Ivy quarterback.

Payson Wick Drake 6-3 285 OG

HM All Pioneer in his first year as a starter. Helped anchor the Bulldog offensive line that helped pave the way for RB to become the fifth Bulldog since 1987 to rush over 1,000 yards.

Cameron Young Weber State 6-3 315 OG

Finished his four-year Weber State career in 2016. He twice earned All-Big Sky honors and started all 47 games of his career at Weber State. 2016: Earned Second Team All-Big Sky honors for the second-straight season after helping lead Weber State to a 7-5 record, a third-place finish in the Big Sky Conference and WSU's first trip to the FCS Playoffs in seven years. Started all 12 games on the offensive line.

Matt Zobrist *Western Illinois* **6-3 290 OG**

Three-year starter, started in all 11 games at right guard. Helped the team rank 12th nationally in time of possession, 20th in tackles for a loss allowed, 31st in sacks allowed and 32nd in total offense. Unit recorded three 100-yard rushing games and six games of 300-plus yards passing.

Jac'Que Polite *Winston-Salem* **6-5 300 OL**

Boxtorow All American, helped guide to WSSU offense to fourth in the CIAA with 393.8 yards per game and fourth in scoring at 31.8 points per game. A two-time first team All-CIAA selection, Polite helped guide the Rams to back to back CIAA Titles and advanced to the first round of the NCAA DII Playoffs.
